This catalog lists 6th-8th grade courses offered at Oak City Academy, including many opportunities to earn High School credit. Parents & students need to carefully consider the information in this catalog so they can make informed decisions about their course of study while taking classes at OCA. The Dean of Education is available to assist students with course selections and to answer questions about their schedules.





Academic Policies

Honors Courses: All students will be eligible to enter honors courses based on teacher and/or parent recommendation. All Honors placement is subject to administrative approval. Honors courses are designed to provide acceleration and enrichment. The pace is designed to challenge students

and provide exploration and discovery at greater depth. Consider student

capacity and desire when making Honors Course selections.

Prerequisites: Some courses have prerequisite requirements. Students must complete the prerequisites before enrolling in these classes.

High School Credit: Select courses give students the opportunity to earn High School credit, once a student passes the class. These classes are listed as "HS Credit" in the course descriptions and only apply to 8th grade students.



Catalog Listings: Although a course is listed, it will not be offered unless a sufficient number of students register for the class. OCA reserves the right to add and remove classes at its discretion.

Course Length: Core courses are yearlong and earn 1 credit. Elective courses are semester-long and earn 0.5 credits.

Program Options

Hybrid Program:

6th- 8th graders who are part of the Hybrid Program receive all core courses and electives on campus at OCA 3 days a week (M,T, Th). Hybrid students field trips are paid for, curriculum is provided, they receive a free OCA T-shirt, and have access to OCA's computers. Families do not need to open a homeschool as they are under OCA's umbrella.



Students in grades 6–8 who are part of the Full-Time Program have access to all the benefits of the Hybrid Program. Full-Time students attend school on campus five days a week and receive support from core teachers for academic assistance, along with additional enrichment classes. The extra courses offered exclusively to Full-Time students include Entrepreneurship 101: Boss Club and Spanish. Hybrid students may choose to take Entrepreneurship 101 and/or Spanish as à la carte options.





Course Grading

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All courses taught for credit receive a letter grade. For High School credit, grading is based on year-long cumulative grades or Pass/Fail (except for electives which are graded by semester). Grading allocations differ by class, depending on the subject and teacher. Specific grading allocations for courses will be provided by each teacher at the beginning of the term.

Attendance Requirements

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Math

OCA uses a block schedule to meet the needs of all grades and programs.

Math

1 Credit

Math reviews foundational math concepts from elementary math and dives into middle school math concepts for advanced 6th grade students or standard track 7th grade students. Students will review whole numbers, decimals, integers, fractions, measurements, and geometry, and they will extend their knowledge of square roots, exponents, algebraic expressions, equations and inequalities, percentages, functions, probability, surface area and volume, and statistics. *Curriculum: BJU Press Fundamentals of Math*

Pre-Algebra*

1 Credit

Pre-Algebra eases the transition from arithmetic to algebra for standard track 8th grade students. Advanced track 7th grade students desiring to take Pre-Algebra must take a placement test to determine readiness. Algebraic expressions and linear equations are applied throughout a thorough review of operations on integers, fractions, decimals, percents, and radicals. Students explore relations and functions using equations, tables, and graphs. Chapters on statistics and geometry extend foundational concepts in preparation for high school courses. Problem-solving and real-life uses of math are featured throughout the year. *Curriculum: BJU Press Pre-Algebra*.

Algebra 1*

(HS Credit)
1 Credit

Algebra I develops an understanding of algebra by justifying methods and by explaining how to solve problems. This course is created for advanced track 8th grade students and standard track 9th grade students. Concepts discussed include graphing, solving systems of equations, operations with polynomials and radicals, factoring polynomials, solving rational equations, and graphing quadratic functions. 8th & 9th grade students will receive High School credit for this course. 8th grade students will receive a P/F grade with credit and 9th graders will receive a letter grade for GPA purposes. Curriculum: BJU Press Algebra 1. Pre-reg: Pre-Algebra

English & Literature

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English 6

1 Credit

English 6 focuses on the persuasive essay introducing The Lost Tools of Writing Level One. Students will learn how to compare the positive and negative aspects of an ethical question rising from novels and short stories. Students learn to craft an argument using the exordium, a strong thesis, convincing proofs, and amplification. This course includes a study of English grammar, providing a summary of major grammatical concepts by examining beautiful sentences written by the authors of great novels in British and American literature. Students will also study The Vocabulary of Literature which highlights the most frequently used words in classic literature, paving a path to a lifetime of enjoyment and love of great literature.

English 7

1 Credit

English 7 continues instruction on the persuasive essay focusing on the more advanced essays in The Lost Tools of Writing Level One, adding instruction in the classical techniques of narratio, division, and refutation. This course also includes a rigorous vocabulary curriculum The Word Within the Word I to illustrate the important role of Latin and Greek stems in English vocabulary. Each lesson contains discussions and illustrations that offer students a greater understanding of the classical roots of the English language. This course also covers a study of English grammar and punctuation using The Magic Lens I. Students will learn to analyze sentences by identifying the parts of speech, the parts of a sentence, and how to implement proper punctuation in their writing.

English 8

1 Credit

English 8 provides a way for students to gain more practice in foundational thinking skills by learning to write the comparison essay. In working through The Lost Tools of Writing: Comparison Essay, students will delve more deeply into analogical thinking with different kinds of metaphor-writing. In learning the art of comparison, students will cultivate more refined and careful thinking about people, things, ideas, and their own decisions. This course also continues the rigorous study of Latin and Greek word stems to aid in the understanding of English vocabulary through The Word Within the Word II. Students will master English grammar in a culminating study of sentence analysis in the The Magic Lens II.

English & Literature

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HS English 1 Honors*

(HS Credit)
1 Credit

English 1 leads students through the process of research writing utilizing Advanced Academic Writing I. Students practice writing academic papers for which they must review their knowledge of grammar and punctuation, learn the MLA method for formatting research papers, become versed in how to structure a well-written paper, and understand standard proofreaders' marks for correcting their work. Students will also study the most advanced concepts in grammar and vocabulary in The Magic Lens III and Word Within the Word III. Students who take this course will be well-prepared for the intellectual and academic demands of a rigorous high school program.

English 8 is a Pre-req (for 8th graders) unless Dean approval

Literature: God's Identity

1 Credit

This class will focus on reading and discussing literature relating to discovering the identity of God. Students will participate in small discussion groups to explore themes of God's identity using a dynamic socratic discussion format. Students will study biblical archetypes found in the Bible and Greek mythology and read novels such as The Bronze Bow. Students will engage in creative projects surrounding the themes of the novels as well as create several book-themed celebrations for the class to enjoy.

Literature: My Identity

1 Credit

This class will focus on reading and discussing literature relating to discovering our God-given identity. Students will participate in small discussion groups to explore themes of identity in each novel using a dynamic socratic discussion format. Texts include The Prince and the Pauper, The Hobbit, The Witch of Blackbird Pond, and A Wrinkle in Time. Students will engage in creative projects surrounding the themes of the novels as well as create several book-themed celebrations for the class to enjoy.

Literature: My Community

1 Credit

This class will focus on reading and discussing literature relating to the importance of building healthy community. Students will participate in small discussion groups to explore themes of community in each novel using a dynamic socratic discussion format. Texts include Mrs. Frisby & the Rats of NIMH, Call of the Wild, Animal Farm, and The Giver. Students will engage in creative projects surrounding the themes of the novels as well as create several book-themed celebrations for the class to enjoy.

Science

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General Science

1 Credit

The Purposeful Design Science series offers an inquiry-based, hands-on science curriculum with a biblical worldview. It includes engaging activities, critical thinking development, and structured investigation across levels. Students will explore Life, Earth, Space, and Physical Sciences. Resources include colorful student books, science notebooks, teacher guides, and support materials, all aimed at fostering a love for science within a Christian framework.

General Science Honors

(HS CREDIT)

1 Credit

General Science Honors is the advanced General Science course. Honors students will be given additional assignments and special projects to complete throughout the year. Honors students should expect to spend more time on coursework and have a more challenging course load. See General Science course description above for more details.

Earth Science

1 Credit

Earth Science is an engaging curriculum that approaches the study of the universe with the goal of guiding students within a Christian worldview. Students will engage in the study of scientific philosophies and models, meteorology, geology, and oceanography. Recommended for 7th and 8th graders.

Earth Science Honors

(HS CREDIT)
1 Credit

Earth Science honors is the advanced Earth Science course. Honors students will be given additional assignments and special projects to complete throughout the year. Honors students should expect to spend more time on coursework and have a more challenging course load. See Earth Science course description above for more details. 8th grade honors students will receive an Earth Science High School credit for this course, providing they pass the class. Recommended for advanced track 8th graders.

Science

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Life Science

1 Credit

Life Science surveys the structures and functions of living things such as plants, animals, and human beings. All these concepts unfold as a quest to understand the life that God has created. Purposeful Design Life Science curriculum helps students think like scientists and see life science from a biblical perspective.

Life Science Honors

1 Credit

Life Science Honors is the advanced Life Science course. Honors students will be given additional assignments and special projects to complete throughout the year. Honors students should expect to spend more time on coursework and have a more challenging course load. See Life Science course description above for more details.

Geography & Church History

Cultural Geography

1 Credit

Cultural Geography provides a survey of geographic principles through a regional approach. Beginning in North America, students will "travel" from continent to continent around the world studying the geography, cultures, land forms, climates, resources, economy, religions, and government of each country.

Cultural Geography Honors

1 Credit

Cultural Geography Honors is the advanced Cultural Geography course. Honors students will be given additional assignments and special projects to complete throughout the year. Honors students should expect to spend more time on coursework and have a more challenging course load. See Cultural Geography course description above for more details.

Church History

1 Credit

OCA's Church History course follows the movement of God from the early church period to the present day reading the book Trial and Triumph. Students will learn how the Lord used various men and women to advance the Gospel throughout the world. After students are inspired by the Lord's use of normal men and women to impact His kingdom, they will participate in a Biblical Justice Project. Students will create a fictional non-profit organization as an expression of how they would like to impact the world around them. By using marketing resources such project boards, business plans, brochures, and even designing websites, students will pitch their non-profit to a "Shark Tank" panel of judges (local Triangle non-profit founders and CEOs). One winner will be chosen to receive a fictional grant!

Church History Honors

1 Credit

Church History Honors is the advanced Church History course. Honors students will be given additional assignments and special projects to complete throughout the year. Honors students should expect to spend more time on coursework and have a more challenging course load. See Church History course description above for more details.

Character & Bible

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Character & Bible: God's Identity 1 Credit

Students will discover God's identity by reading and discussing The Good and Beautiful God: Falling in Love with the God Jesus Knows by James Bryan Smith. Class material will present how to experience transformation by challenging false beliefs about God and discovering the God that Jesus revealed in Scripture. Students will engage in thoughtful discussion, scripture memory, and soul training exercises designed to help them grow as followers of Jesus.

Character & Bible: My Identity

1 Credit

Students will discover their own God-given identity by reading and discussing The Good and Beautiful You: Discovering the Person Jesus Created You to Be by James Bryan Smith. Students will learn how to overcome toxic self-narratives by discovering the person Jesus created them to be through the beautiful healing God provides. Students will engage in thoughtful discussion, scripture memory, and soul training exercises designed to help them grow as followers of Jesus.

Character & Bible: My Community

1 Credit

Students will discover the importance of community by reading and discussing The Good and Beautiful Life: Putting on the Character of Christ and The Good and Beautiful Community: Following the Spirit, Extending Grace, Demonstrating Love by James Bryan Smith. Students will learn practical ways to engage in spiritual disciplines and how to bring personal faith and relationships within the community of Christ-followers together. Students will engage in thoughtful discussion, scripture memory, and soul training exercises designed to help them grow as followers of Jesus.

Generosity

The Generosity class explores and practices seven key principles of living generously. Through engaging films, Biblical teachings, and real-world experiences, students learn the value of generosity in various aspects of life. Our Generous Classrooms curriculum emphasizes cultivating empathy, kindness, and the importance of making a positive impact in their schools, homes, and communities. Students actively practice generosity, not only with their classmates but also alongside their families, in collaboration with local community partners. For example, this year, our students are partnering with First Baptist Garner's Community of Hope to support their food pantry and Christmas food drive.

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Leadership Development & Foreign Language

These courses are included for students in the Full-Time program. Hybrid students are welcome to add these courses a la carte.

Entrepreneurship 101: Boss Club

.5 Credit

Led by OCA's very own Entrepreneur & Founder of OCA, Mr. Breed, students will design and launch a small business. Daily lessons learned in class are immediately applied to their business with real world successes and failures. Students are given the resources to understand the basics of product design, pricing, marketing and sales, financial reporting, and community stewardship. This curriculum is designed to teach students the basics of entrepreneurship through actually creating a small business over the course of a semester. Not only will students learn the basics of starting a small business, they will also learn what the Bible says about financial stewardship, business ethics, and the Christian view of work. Students have the option to take this class for half a year or a whole year. See more information on the flyer on page 15.

Spanish

1 Credit

This self-paced class incorporates online learning via IXL, group activities employing the concepts learned, and explorations of several Spanish-speaking cultures. Each student begins with the foundational principles of the Spanish language, including letters, numbers, greetings and introductions, then moves through lessons to more advanced conversational topics. Using Montessori principles, the teacher is there to guide and answer questions, while allowing each individual to explore and gain ownership of the material. Students are encouraged to create language-learning games (using Blooket and other applications) to play/learn with their classmates. Students also co-create opportunities, throughout the year, to sample elements of several Spanish-speaking countries, including music, food, and cultural celebrations.

Electives

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The following electives are available for the 2024–2025 school year. While these offerings reflect the types of electives typically available, they are not guaranteed for the 2025–2026 school year. Electives will be offered based on student interest and enrollment numbers.

Nature Journaling with Watercolors

.5 Credit Semester Long Led by OCA mom Shannon Newby, students will delve into the world of nature journaling and watercolor painting, exploring techniques and styles that bring vibrant colors to life on paper. Through learning fundamental skills such as watercolor brush techniques, color mixing, and layering, students will gain confidence in building a portfolio of artwork. Emphasis will be placed on sharpening observation skills through collecting, studying, drawing and painting our nature finds.

3D Design

.5 Credit Semester Long In this class, we explore the wild, wacky and whimsical side of threedimensional works of art. Through developing personal expression and creativity, students will experiment with different tools and techniques, including cardboard construction and prototyping methods. This course encourages artistic growth and confidence, providing a supportive environment for students to share their work and collaborate. Whether you are a novice or have prior experience, this class offers a fantastic opportunity to enhance your artistic abilities.

Pickleball

.5 Credit Semester Long Pickleball is a fast-paced, fun, and accessible sport that combines elements of tennis, badminton, and ping-pong. In this elective, students will learn the rules of the game, practice fundamental skills like serving, volleying, and positioning, and engage in both singles and doubles play. The course emphasizes sportsmanship, strategy, and teamwork while providing a great opportunity for physical fitness. No prior experience is required.

Keyboard

.5 Credit Semester Long In this elective, students will explore the fundamentals of piano playing, including proper technique, music theory, and repertoire. Whether you're a beginner or have some experience, this course is designed to accommodate all skill levels. Students will learn to read music, develop their ear training, and practice basic scales and chords. Through individual and group activities, participants will enhance their performance skills while exploring various musical styles, from classical to contemporary. By the end of the course, students will have the confidence to play pieces they enjoy and a deeper appreciation for music.

Boss Club

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This hands-on enrichment course is designed to empower students with the skills and mindset needed to launch their own businesses from a Biblical worldview. Led by OCA's very own Entrepreneur & Founder of OCA, Mr. Breed, students will design and launch a small business.


